The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm and roll call was taken.

Emergency Management

1. First Reading: Discussion of Placement of an Outdoor Warning Siren at the Following Locations:

A copy of the staff reports for each property, read by Deputy Director Chris Kelley, and all public comment forms are attached to the end of the minutes.

Dave Dunford stated he retired as the Operations Manager for the Office of Emergency Management in Lenexa, Kansas. Mr. Dunford stated there is a system in Boone County, which he helped introduce, that is a two-way telemetry system. Mr. Dunford stated, as the sirens are activated, the computer display at the dispatch center gives a printout of where all sirens in the County are located. Mr. Dunford stated this printout shows the conditions of the sirens and if

there has been a system failure. Mr. Dunford stated this is very helpful for OEM, and it shows exactly where something might have gone wrong, such as a door being pried open, low battery, or something else. Mr. Dunford stated this has been a step forward for Boone County so someone doesn't have to go out to every siren. He further stated that Boone County's siren system is a very sophisticated system. Commissioner Kendrick asked Mr. Dunford how often OEM might see a failure on the two-way telemetry. Deputy Director Kelley stated the system sends a message to each site at around 4:00am each day, which essentially asks if the system is okay. Deputy Director Kelley stated, once the site receives that message, the site reports back with readings such as "battery is low." Brian Cates stated the siren systems have evolved over the last 25 years, and he started working with the City of Columbia in 1995, when the City of Columbia began adding and upgrading sirens. Mr. Cates stated you may see a lot of overlap on the maps regarding coverage, and because this has been done over time, sirens have been placed around the County due to new subdivisions. Mr. Cates stated the map looks like the system isn't very efficient in where they are placed, but that's because they work around subdivisions as the County grows. GIS Manager Nathan Mattox stated his role is to provide the base data that OEM can use in their analysis, and he provides the tools for them to have a visual of the areas.





Church on Palis Nichols and Liberty Lane Site

OEM staff and the county's siren system provider identified a coverage gap area near this site by looking at our current outdoor warning siren system coverage map with the most recent 2020 U.S. Census data overlay. We drove around the identified gap area to find the proposed site based on the Outdoor Warning Siren Policy adopted by the County Commission. We found the New Liberty Primitive Baptist Church property at 4200 East Liberty Lane to be acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance, and the elevation was ideal to cover the identified gap area. In addition, the siren will serve a new residential development that is proposed by the City of Ashland located east of this site.










The utility locate results were inspected and we were able to determine this site would not interfere with underground utilities.




O'Rear Road Site

OEM staff and the county's siren system provider identified a coverage gap area near this site by looking at our current outdoor warning siren system coverage map with the most recent 2020 U.S. Census data overlay. We drove around the identified gap area to find the proposed site based on the Outdoor Warning Siren Policy adopted by the County Commission. We attempted to find a site that was not close in proximity to a residential structure, however, we could not find another suitable site that would serve the gap area sufficiently based on the site choice criteria in the policy. We found a site on the south side of O'Rear Road just east of Lisa Drive using the Boone County Right of Way area to be acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance, and the elevation was ideal to cover the identified gap area.










After identifying this site, we received verbal confirmation from our county officials that we could utilize the Boone County Right of Way for this prosed site, and we requested a design utility locate to see if the site location would interfere with underground utilities.


The utility locate results were inspected and we were able to determine this site would not interfere with underground utilities.

Once this site was determined to be a viable siren site, we followed the adopted policy by mailing 29 letters to constituents within 200 feet of this proposed site informing them they could request a hearing concerning the site before the County Commission. We were contacted by four constituents that requested a hearing concerning this site.

Church on Sinclair Road site

OEM staff and the county's siren system provider identified a coverage gap area near this site by looking at our current outdoor warning siren system coverage map with the most recent 2020 U.S. Census data overlay. We drove around the identified gap area to find the proposed site based on the Outdoor Warning Siren Policy adopted by the County Commission. We found the Pueblo De Dios Church property located at 6401 S. Sinclair Road to be acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance,. In addition, upon completing driving surveys of the area we were able to determine siren site 59 located at 1641 West Route K and siren site 8 near Route K and Seminole Court were not adequately serving the higher elevation north section of the Cascade Neighborhood area due to them both being located at lower elevations. This new proposed site will therefore serve the gap in coverage discovered in the north Cascades Neighborhood area.











We found the Crossing Church property at 3615 Southland Drive to be acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance, and the elevation was ideal to cover the identified gap area.










The utility locate results were inspected and we were able to determine this site would not interfere with underground utilities.


Once this site was determined to be a viable siren site, we followed the adopted policy by mailing thirty letters to constitutes within 200 feet of this proposed site informing them they could request a hearing concerning the site before the County Commission. We were contacted by one constituent that requested a hearing on this site.

High Point Lane Site

OEM staff and the county's siren system provider identified a coverage gap area near this site by looking at our current outdoor warning siren system coverage map with the most recent 2020 U.S. Census data overlay. We drove around the identified gap area to find the proposed site based on the Outdoor Warning Siren Policy adopted by the County Commission. We attempted to find a site that was not close in proximity to a residential structure however we could not find another suitable site that would serve the gap area sufficiently based on the site choice criteria in the policy. We found a site on the north side of High Point Lane just east of Cresskill Drive in the Boone County Right of Way area to be acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance, and the siren coverage would cover most of the identified gap coverage area. This site will serve future population density growth in this area.










The utility locate results were inspected and we were able to determine this site would not interfere with underground utilities.



We were contacted by one constituent that requested a hearing concerning this site.

Easley River Road Site

OEM staff and the county's siren system provider identified this area as there are citizens that recreate in this area using the MKT trail and individuals visiting the Cooper's Landing that maintains a campground and an outdoor entertainment area and this area is not currently served by an outdoor warning siren. This site placement will also allow the small town of Easley to receive siren coverage. We drove around this area and found the proposed site based on the Outdoor Warning Siren Policy adopted by the County Commission. We found this site acceptable as it had the needed infrastructure for the siren, the location was easily accessible for maintenance, and the elevation was ideal to cover the identified gap area. We found that this site was on Missouri Department of Natural Resources (DNR) property, and we gained verbal permission from their management representative to pursue this proposed siren site.







After identifying this site, we received verbal confirmation from Missouri DNR staff that we could utilize their property for this proposed site, and we requested a design utility locate to see if the site location would interfere with underground utilities.

The utility locate results were inspected and we were able to determine this site would not interfere with underground utilities.

Once this site was determined to be a viable siren site, we followed the adopted policy by mailing nine letters to constituents within 200 feet of this proposed site informing them they could request a hearing concerning the site before the County Commission. We were contacted by two constituents that requested a hearing concerning this site.

Measuring External Obsolescence on Emergency Warning Siren's

Comments: Measuring whether an emergency warning siren has a negative impact or creates external obsolescence on real property value is a function of the Real Estate Market. There are several ways to measure if the addition of emergency warning sirens creates any external obsolescence. For rental properties, any loss of income can be capitalized into a loss in value. In the case of an owner-occupied single-family dwelling, analyzing paired sales of similar properties. If applied correctly a lump-sum estimate for total depreciation can be estimated. Once total depreciation is estimated, curable and incurable, physical and functional depreciation should be deducted from total depreciation. Any residual depreciation could be external obsolescence. For an estimation of external obsolescence using paired sales there should be reasonable sample of recently closed sales.

In researching for studies on the effects on real property values by adding emergency warning sirens, neither the International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO) or the Appraisal Institute (AI) had any data indicating they had impact on real property values. Unlike traffic noise or offensive odors from nearby factories that can have a negative effect on real property values. Without market data indicating that adding an emergency warning siren would have a negative effect on real property values, I would not be justified to make a downward valuation adjustment.

Hi Chris,

My name is Michael Wells and I am a biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. I'm responding to your request for information to address a public comment concerning tornado sirens and the potential for negative effects on birds nearby. A tornado siren's monthly test is not expected to have negative effects on bird populations. Bird species that have adapted to urban areas near roads and highways like the proposed area tolerate urban noise like traffic and emergency vehicle sirens, which are more consistent noise levels than the tornado siren's frequency via monthly tests or in periods of inclement weather. Many species of birds use clocktowers or church steeples for roosting or nesting with no ill effect from daily or hourly chimes and bells. Behavioral responses to a loud noise such as an emergency siren may include flushing or moving away from the siren, but this response is temporary and birds return to normal activities quickly after the cessation of tests. Given the short test length and long interval between tests, no adverse effects are expected for bird populations from such equipment.

I am here to discuss the placement of a tornado siren in the cemetery adjacent to Arrowhead Lake. This siren would be visible at the entrance to the subdivision. In addition, the site is very near homes in Arrowhead. We have several concerns about placement in general, and at this location.

- 1. The studies done with placement of these sirens is not scientific. It doesn't seem that the method of where to put sirens has a "testing" element to it.
- 2. The area map that shows where the siren can be heard is not accurate. We have houses in the non-hear area, like mine, where the siren can be clearly heard inside the house.
- 3. We are also being asked to work with Ameren, who wants to install poles in our neighborhood, which has underground utilities, to install wifi boxes so they can read their new meters. We think it is important for the county leaders to have a more broad discussion about and have a policy regarding anything on a pole, including tornado sirens, and if there is an alternative way to accomplish the task.
- 4. The sirens and their untreated wood poles, with equipment hanging on the side, are unsightly.
- 5. We are asking the commission to delay this decision until we can more accurately find out where the siren is not heard.
- 6. A couple alternative sites to explore would be near Beulah Ralph School or on the undeveloped property on Sinclair Road toward the western edge.
